

WVU IACUC Policy:

Training Requirements for Animal Use in Agricultural Research and Teaching

Purpose

West Virginia University (WVU) is committed to observing federal policies, regulations and the AAALAC International standards for the humane care and use of animals. This policy describes the IACUC training requirements for individuals involved in the care and use of live vertebrate animals as part of the Animal Care and Use Program at WVU.

Additional training, such as biohazard, radiation or chemical safety training, may be required and is available upon request, depending on the nature of the animal work. Background

According to the *Guide for the Care and Use of Agricultural Animals in Research and Teaching*: “It is the responsibility of the institution to ensure that scientists, agricultural animal care staff, students, and other individuals who care for or use agricultural animals are qualified to do so through training or experience.”

Required Training

1. Research and Teaching Personnel included on an IACUC approved protocol

- “Working with the IACUC” CITI course
- Species-specific CITI course(s)
- Specific training related to animal use and safety procedures instructed by the PI or their designee

2. Students registered in WVU courses involving the use of live animals

- “Agricultural zoonosis concerns” CITI course

OR

- Faculty wishing to include Animal Use training as a portion of their curriculum can submit a Student Alternative Training form with the IACUC: [IACUC: Student Alternative Training Statement](#)
The following topics **must** be covered:
 - Basic humane handling and care of the species involved
 - Signs of pain and distress in the species involved
 - Zoonotic disease and safety concerns associated with the involved species
 - How to report animal welfare concerns to the IACUC
